The Making of a Kehillah

It's the spring of 1982 and the population of Atlanta is booming. Imagine this if you can, people are actually moving outside of the perimeter to live. There's a young Rabbi, assistant Rabbi at another local area synagogue, who envisions Atlanta's immense growth with opportunity and potential.

This story, like so many other Jewish stories, involves dinner at a Chinese Restaurant, a meal complete with dreaming, planning and thoughts to the future. As the months go by, conversations between Rabbi Winokur and his friend and fellow Temple Sinai congregant, Alan Abrams, continue and begin to build momentum. The idea was to start a new congregation, one that would serve those who were looking for a different kind of kehillah, **a community that reached out in a new way to those who were interfaith or unaffiliated, those who wanted a new approach to worship and observance.**

With 15 families, the new kehillah was born in the summer of 1982 and began gathering for prayer and learning. It wasn't long before 15 families grew to 100 families, then 150. It seemed there were many people who appreciated a less traditional approach to Judaism and embraced the idea of this new kehillah. While the first few years were spent meeting and worshipping in a variety of interesting locations such as a bank, rented school classrooms, and a variety of churches, all were still locations inside the perimeter. It wasn't long before thoughts of a putting down roots started to arise and the idea of growth outside the perimeter was broached.

The move to Roswell in **1987** wasn't an easy one for Temple Kehillat Chaim, but it felt like the right move at the right time. It was especially difficult because some members didn't follow as the congregation established its roots outside the perimeter. But with progress, comes change. And with change, comes progress. The congregation successfully established itself in historic Roswell, a home that became our permanent location for the past **twenty-four** years.

It is not too late for your child to join the TKC Junior Choir! This choral group is open to all Kehillah religious school students in grades 2 through 6. During these rehearsals we prepare songs for various worship services at the Kehillah.

No audition is required. However, I will require a commitment from each member to attend all rehearsals and performances. CALLING ALL ADULTS: Many of you have told me how much you enjoy the music of our adult choir. Sometimes you've gone on to say that you'd love to sing with us, but you don't think your voice or Hebrew is good enough. Well, I have news for you. But you do need two things: 1) a fierce desire to lend your voice and fervor to our Adult Volunteer Choir as we continue in our mission to add beauty and spirituality to our Services, and 2) a commitment to attending Tuesday night rehearsals (Tuesday and Thursday night rehearsals for the weeks preceding the High Holy Days) and scheduled Choir performances. We all learn the Hebrew together, and I can show you how your very own voice can produce the most beautiful sounds.

NEWS FROM THE DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION

We teach rituals and prayers, create ritual objects, and we make up our own songs and plays about bible stories in our religious school. That knowledge lasts for the time it is being presented and then what happens to it? When “real-time” connections are made by home ritual, coming to services or holiday celebrations, lasting connections are made.

According to studies done regarding brain-based learning, connecting knowledge to things already experienced or repeated practice and experiences enhances the educational process. This enables the learner to further explore information presented and allows for a deeper understanding of how ideas relate to one another.

For example, we expose our young children to services around holiday times because they are “fun”. As the child ages, he/she enters Religious School. They learn that the language of the Jewish people is Hebrew. Our primary focus is Hebrew as it is used in prayer, as that is where the majority of our students will make a connection to Hebrew. We begin with the alef-bet, and associate the letters with prior knowledge, that is the prayers they will have heard as part the service or home ritual. We utilize different modalities of learning by introducing chanting of the prayers, expanding the knowledge and furthering the connection. The next logical step would seem to be that the information is put to use either by regular home ritual or practice and/or regular service attendance. This allows the brain to cement the connection because there is practical application.

We make ritual objects, such as a menorah, having a great time with clay, wood, paint or whatever. The student takes the menorah home. Parents will ooh and ah, and, hopefully, use the menorah as part of their celebration. This creates a wonderful connection that will linger long after Chanukah is done when we use something they have created.

In Preschool, we provide wooden Shabbat, Chanukah and Passover play sets for our students to use as part of their everyday experience. Our hope is that parents will continue the rituals at home. We even model some of the rituals for parents during our Preschool Kabbalat Shabbat on Fridays.

We can and should work together to help our children to make stronger connections to Judaism. It takes a team, the clergy, the teachers, grandparents, neighbors, friends and YOU! As we begin this year, may we all make a commitment to help our children and ourselves strengthen connections to Judaism.

In 1980, my parents arrived in the United States with little money, few possessions, and a three-year-old daughter, my sister Evelina, in tow. They didn't know the language, they didn't know many people, but they had big dreams, one of which was to fully embrace their religion in a way that the Soviet Union didn't allow. To that end, as my sister neared the age of Bat Mitzvah, my parents went in search of a religious home and found Rabbi Winokur and Temple Kehillat Chaim. From that day to this – going on 22 years now – the Shmukler, and now Erste, family has made its home at TKC.

I grew up attending Sunday and Hebrew school in a little white cottage on the Kehillah's grounds. When the education building was under construction, we proudly sponsored the furniture in one of the classrooms. From the day we joined in 1989, we have celebrated milestones of joy and sadness with the Kehillah. In 1991, my sister became a Bat Mitzvah – the first woman ever in our family to have the honor. Six years later, in 1997, I followed. In 2000, my brother Jacob became a Bar Mitzvah – the first male in our family to have a Bar Mitzvah celebration in four generations.

In April 2007, Rabbi Winokur witnessed my marriage to my husband Lou, and in March 2010, he gave our daughter Leah her Hebrew name. He guided my sister Evelina and her husband Paul to a Rabbi in Mississippi for their wedding (because he unfortunately couldn't be there) in May 2009, and this past Thanksgiving, he gave my nephew Samuel his Hebrew name as well. He, and the congregation, have also been there for the sad occasions, the passing of my grandfathers and my great-aunt, and has remained our spiritual advisor throughout the path of our growing family's lives.

Today, I am honored to be back at the Kehillah as an adult member of the congregation, serving on the board and teaching 7th grade Judaics on Sunday mornings. I am excited for the opportunity to lead the Kehillah and our committed Membership Engagement Committee. I am blessed to have a spiritual home to come to, a family – some of whom have watched me grow up and now insist I call them by their first names! – to be a part of, and a loving and vibrant Jewish community in which to raise my daughter. I look forward to bringing her to services, helping her prepare to become a Bat Mitzvah, and watching her become the third generation to continue the great work we have all started in creating our Kehillah.

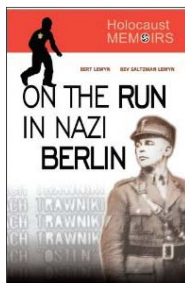

Aging: Facing the Facts, Feelings & Fears

Aging is something each of us will face in more ways than one during our lives. Our parents age, our spouses age, we all age. And with aging comes a variety of health issues – physical as well as mental. Do you know what to expect in your aging parents, your spouse or yourself? And are you prepared for the things that can happen?

“People often don’t begin to investigate the available resources for aging until there’s a crisis, and then they react without information and education,” says Connie White, Director of Aviv Older Adult Services – Tools for Aging.

Now is the time to get a head start and learn some helpful information about aging. On Sunday, Jan. 29, Jewish Family & Career Services (JF&CS) and the Atlanta Rabbinical Association (ARA) are co-sponsoring a workshop that will present an overview of aging services, including information you need to know as well as issues for caregivers. The program, featuring experts from JF&CS’ Tools for Aging Division, will include two breakout sessions: the Practicalities of Aging, which will explore some common questions about what to look for (How do I know when something is wrong? What are the red flags?), and the Spiritual and Emotional Side of Aging, which will examine more personal questions (How do I deal with my feelings about the changes happening with my parents? How do I change my role from adult child to caregiver?). Rabbi Fred Greene of Temple Beth Tikvah will join the panel on emotional and spiritual questions as well.

“To be armed with some information to have a basic understanding of what’s out there is really valuable, and January is a great time of the year for this discussion,” says Connie. “Over the November/December holidays is when a lot of people go to visit their families, and they start to notice things – their mother’s clothes are always dirty, their father is having trouble remembering things, and so forth. They start to realize something is wrong, and it’s still fresh in their minds.”

Thinking back to Thanksgiving and the winter holidays, did you notice anything different about your aging parents? Or, are you noticing some changes in yourself or spouse? Age-related changes tend to spike seasonally, when people can have trouble transitioning from one period to another. If you can relate to any of these types of things, this workshop is for you.

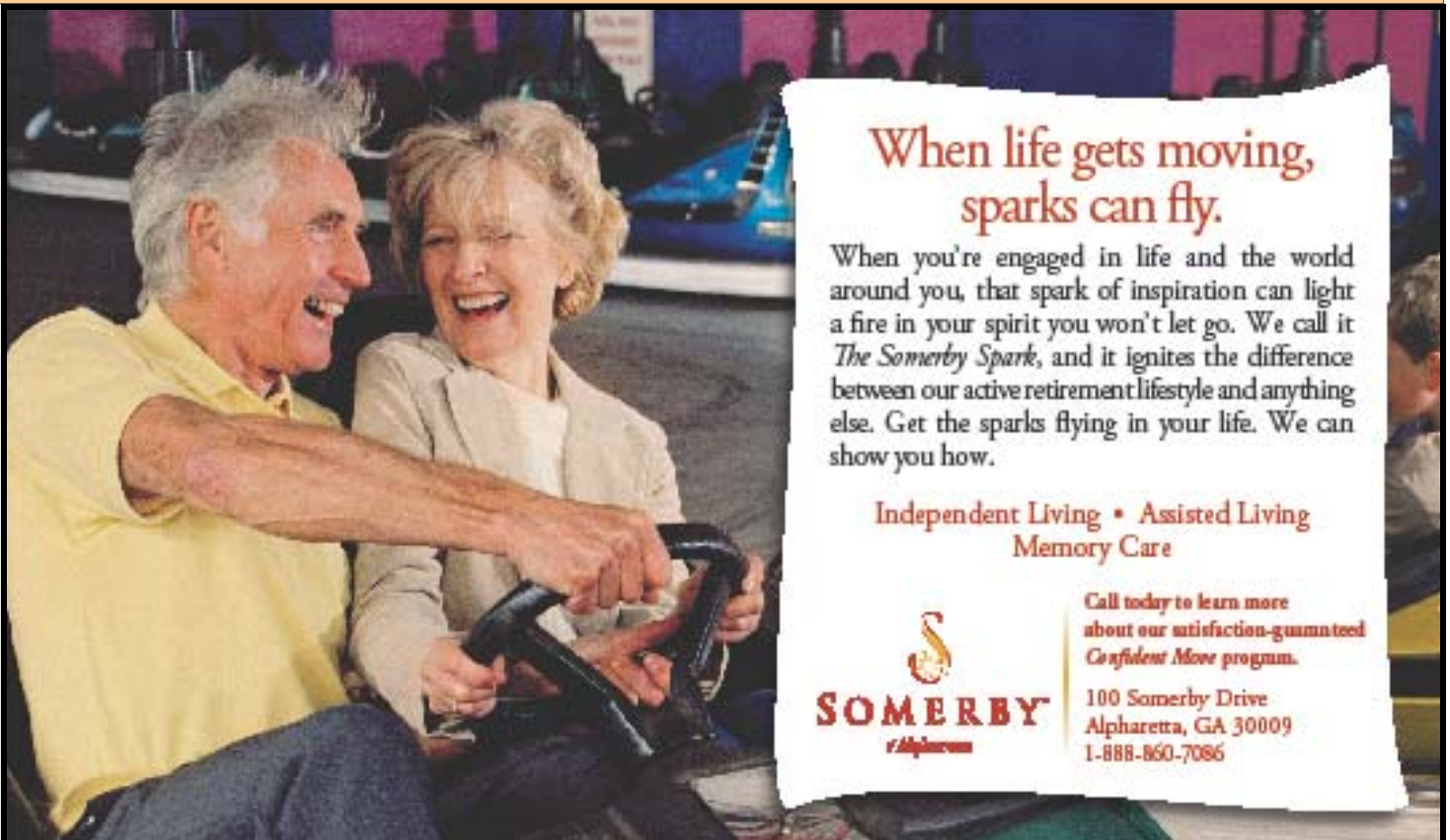
