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A Note From the Rabbi

Ukraine

The wolf shall dwell with the lamb, the leopard lie down with the kid; the calf, the beast of prey, and the fatling together, with a small child to herd them. – Isaiah 11:6

Jewish people have a long and often troubled history in what is nowadays Ukraine. In the 17th century, tens of thousands Jews were murdered there in one of the worst pogroms in European history - the Khmelnitsky massacres. When Ukraine was part of czarist Russia, Jews often suffered. There's a reason that in Fiddler on the Roof, the rabbi blesses the czar by saying, "May God bless the czar and keep the czar far away from us!" In the late 19th and early 20th century, when many Jews had the opportunity to leave, they did – migrating to places like the United States and the United Kingdom. Of course, the 20th century was even worse to Jews in Europe. In two days in 1941, over 30,000 Jews were killed at Babi Yar, just outside of Kiev, and some estimate that more than a million and a half Ukrainian Jews were murdered in the Holocaust. When the Soviet Union fell, many more chose to leave. With a history like that, one might ask, so why in the world would any Jew care what happens there now? Yet, I think we should all care.

Reasons why we should care include the obvious humanitarian crisis that always comes with war, but two other reasons are 1) because Ukrainian democracy, however flawed, is now under siege and 2) imperial ambitions risk threatening the peace and freedom of all people.

For the first reason, Ukraine is now a democracy. While it reportedly has all sorts of issues, notably corruption, and more, it is still a democracy, and ideally offers the promise of freedom that all democracies do. Despite a history of Jewish tragedies in Ukraine, in 2022, the President of Ukraine, Volodymr Zelensky is Jewish (which also makes

Putin's claim that he wants to 'de-Nazi' Ukraine very odd). Not only that, but since its independence after the fall of the Soviet Union, Ukraine has also had two other Jewish prime ministers. Now, I don't know if Zelensky is a good or bad president or if I would have voted for him if I were Ukrainian, but Ukraine has overcome centuries of persecuting Jews to freely electing one as a leader. Beyond that, Jewish life had once again begun to flourish in Ukraine, with significant communities in places like Kyiv and Odessa. That is the promise of democracy and freedom at its best- it allows people and communities to thrive. It's true that democracies sometimes fail to live up to their high ideals - and that's true in Ukraine as it is here in the US. Yet, maybe Churchill had it right when he said that democracy was the worst, save for all the other systems of government that have been tried. Here's what's important though - it is up for Ukrainians to decide their own future – not to have one imposed on them by a foreign invader.

Second, imperial ambitions are a great risk to more than just the immediate target. Jews have long memories of what can go wrong when a large, powerful country looks greedily at its smaller neighbor. Our Hebrew Bible hopes for the day when "the wolf shall dwell with the lamb, the leopard lie down with the kid; the calf, the beast of prey, and the fatling together, with a small child to herd them" (Isaiah 11:6). This is, of course, a hope to end outside imperial rule. Jews have seen the awful results of imperial ambition from Assyria, Babylonia, Persia, the Greek Seleucids, Rome, and more. Israelites and Jews were targeted directly by these empires, but they weren't the only ones. Imperial ambition usually doesn't impose limits on itself. When morality no longer stops a country from deciding to claim another by force, everyone's freedom and peace is threatened. In more recent times, Europe can't forget Nazi Germany claiming Poland as its own, beginning World War II.

When Judaism began, the world often operated under the principle that might made right. Our prophets challenged that thinking. Putin has a large army. But he's wrong, and sadly, will do whatever he can get away with it. Let us pray for peace and freedom in Ukraine and the whole world.





News from TKC President Alan Abrams



An Important Milestone

This month, Temple Kehillat Chaim is beginning the celebration of our 40th anniversary. On the evening of March 19th, I hope you will be joining me for the gala celebration of TKC's founding!

At dinner in a Chinese restaurant in January 1982, Rabbi Winokur and I agreed to create our kehillah. Now forty years later, TKC continues to thrive and prosper, offering each of spiritual nourishment. Now beginning our fifth decade, I see the same spirit of community and fellowship we enjoyed from our earliest years, clearly demonstrating how wonderful and supportive our kehillah remains today.

Forty years is an important milestone and has a great significance in Jewish tradition. Our ancient ancestors seem to have adopted the notion that the fortieth year was the height of a person's life; and from this fact forty years came to represent a generation. There are many references to 40-year periods in the Bible, including that Isaac married when forty years old, as did Esau. Of course the Hebrews after fleeing slavery in Egypt wandered for forty years in the desert before being permitted by God to enter the Promised Land. In the Book of Joshua, Caleb mentions that he was 40 years old when he was sent out as a spy in the second year of the 40-year wilderness journey. Each of several of the judges in the Bible ruled for forty years, as did King David and King Solomon.

So it seems more than appropriate that we are celebrating this anniversary, as our Temple begins our next "generation" as a kehillah!

Here are a few interesting historical tidbits about TKC's first forty years you may not know:

- We held our first Shabbat worship service led by Rabbi Winokur at the old Atlanta Jewish Community Center in midtown in April 1982.
- Rabbi Winokur officially became our Rabbi on July 1, 1982, after we had raised enough money to enter into his first employment agreement and pay for his move back to Atlanta from Baltimore.
- Our first High Holy Day services were held at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Buckhead in September and October 1982.

- During the next few years, we celebrated the High Holy Days at the Waverly Hotel at the Cobb Galleria.
- During our early years, we held weekly Shabbat services at various locations, including the lobby of a bank, a condominium club house, and at least 3 different churches in Sandy Springs.
- We leased space on West Wieuca Road, just west of Roswell Road, which served as Rabbi Winokur's office and our first meeting space for our Board of Trustees and other newly formed committees and auxiliaries.
- We affiliated with the UAHC (now the URJ) as a reform congregation in our first year.
- Our synagogue's name from 1982-1985 was "Kehillat Chaim". Beside being difficult for some to pronounce, many in the Atlanta community assumed that based on our name, we must be orthodox! So in the fall of 1985, we added "Temple" to become Temple Kehillat Chaim.
- Our religious school met for several years on Sunday mornings at the Galloway School in Chastain Park, and later at nearby Dykes High School (now Sutton Middle School).
- As we grew, having these multiple locations became a bigger and bigger challenge, so the Board began to consider how and where we could establish a permanent home of our own. A Board member who was out to dinner at a Chinese Restaurant (of course!) overheard a group in conversation at the table next to him discussing plans to relocate their church in Roswell to a bigger facility, and what to do with their current facility on Green Street. Thanks to his eavesdropping, soon thereafter TKC purchased their old facility, which we shared with the church for a year while their new facility was being constructed.
- Our new kehillah office was in a little house across Green Street in what is now our gravel parking lot. Our religious school met in a separate building in what is now our staff and clergy offices. About a dozen or so years later, we remodeled and expanded the sanctuary and built a new education building, to create the beautiful facilities that we now enjoy.

It is incredibly gratifying to me to see that what we envisioned all those years ago is still what we are today – vibrant, inclusive and supportive of each other, and welcoming all to join us, no matter their income, their sexual preference, their race, or the religion of their spouse. I feel incredibly privileged to have enjoyed the honor to serve as your president during TKC's first three years, as well as these last two years. And now I am really excited about this month's gala celebration, and I hope I will see you there!

Religious School Update

Sixth Grade Family Education Day


