A Note From the Rabbi

The Blessings Make it All Worthwhile

When I meet with prospective conversion students, I feel that it's important that I give them some of the fine print, which includes being Jewish means that some people won't like you simply because you're Jewish. In recent years, I've emphasized that warning even more. I don't want to scare people away, but I do want people to know what they're getting into. After the Unite the Right rally in Charlottesville, the shootings at Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh and Chabad of Poway, and now the hostagetaking in Colleyville, Texas, it's hard to deny the growing frequency of significant anti-Jewish violence. That's to say nothing of the many other incidents of anti-Semitism, such as the Nazi graffiti at Pope High School.

TKC, like nearly every other synagogue, has detailed security procedures and policies. We received a grant for and are now spending tens of thousands of dollars to help secure our physical infrastructure, from a concrete blockade so people don't drive through our glass doors, to enhanced lighting and security cameras all over the

place. We often have a uniformed police officer present at large gatherings, including most worship services and every Sunday that religious school is in session. A few years ago, our teachers and staff participated in training from the Roswell Police Department on what to do if there is an active shooter. We're now looking at a refresher session. It's sad that we must do this, and I'm envious of the many churches that prop their front door open as a display of welcome. Our doors are nearly always locked as a precaution.

At the same time, we must not let anti-Semites keep us apart or away from our Judaism. It's prudent that we take security seriously, but the best response isn't just more security, it's championing our values, which include respect for human dignity, building bridges between different peoples, and always pursuing peace. When we show up for services, programs, or learning, we show up for a vision of a world that doesn't operate according to bigotries and violence. When we show up, it's both in defiance of anti-Semites as well as in support for something better.

My conversations with conversion students might always include a warning, but they also include a welcome. And while I share that there are dangers and risks, I also say that there are blessings. Those blessings are what makes it all worthwhile.

News from TKC President Alan Abrams



What We Must Do

The recent hostage crisis at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas, was another nightmare come true for the American Jewish community and a shocking reminder of the current state of antisemitism in America. Just as when the target of a violent antisemitic attack was the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh or the Chabad of Poway synagogue in California, the Texas attack was an attack on all of us.

It was impossible for me to watch the event unfold without imagining it playing out in our kehillah and during our own Shabbat services. It was a painful reminder that the threat to the Jewish community in America remains at a significant and lethal level.

75+ years after the end of the Shoah, antisemitism is still being expressed publicly and violently, and classic antisemitic tropes are freely expressed. Although Jews are less than 2 percent of the U.S. population, the FBI reports that over 60 percent of all victims of anti-religious hate crimes last year targeted Jewish communities across the country. Assault, harassment, and vandalism against Jews remain at nearhistoric levels in the U.S., according to the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) in its most recent Audit of Antisemitic Incidents: there were more than 2,100 reported antisemitic incidents at synagogues, Jewish community centers and Jewish schools in 2021, an increase of 12% over 2020 and 40% over 2019. This is the highest level of antisemitic incidents since ADL's tracking began in 1979, and included five fatalities directly linked to antisemitic violence and another 91 individuals targeted in physical assaults.

Unlike many other bigotries, antisemitism is not merely a social prejudice; it is a conspiracy theory about how the world operates. Apparently the Texas terrorist attacked the synagogue because he believed centuries-old antisemitic tropes that we Jews secretly control the moves of politicians, financial institutions and the media, and can manipulate world events to our advantage. After he pulled a gun on the Texas congregation, he demanded to speak to the Rabbi of New York's Central Synagogue, who he claimed could authorize the release of Aafia Siddiqui, a Pakistani woman serving an 86-year sentence in federal prison facility near the synagogue. He apparently was certain that the Jewish worshipers assembled for Shabbat could make that happen.

Following the Texas attack, news headlines reported that

Jewish institutions are on heightened alert. And yet, we know that the reality of being a Jew today is to be on heightened alert at all times, living with the ever-present knowledge that we may be at risk simply by being ourselves, by embracing our faith, and by being Jews.

The American Jewish Committee recently released a report titled *The State of Antisemitism in America* that further details the rise of antisemitism. Among the report's key findings:

- One in four American Jews say they have been targets of antisemitism in the last 12 months;
- Four in 10 American Jews have changed their behavior out of fear;
- Four out of 10 of all Americans have personally witnessed antisemitic incidents;
- 82% of American Jews say antisemitism has risen over the last five years, while only 44% of the general public believes that to be the case.

Nevertheless, although antisemitism may be at an all-time high in our country, I firmly believe that we cannot let fear rule our lives or dampen the joy of our Judaism!

Instead, what we can do - what we must do - is take measures to make sure that our kehillah is as secure as possible, and to ensure preparedness, to the best of our ability, in the event that the unthinkable happens.

It is important to note that the Texas hostages were not rescued by law enforcement; instead they successfully escaped. Congregation Beth Israel's heroic rabbi, Charlie Cytron-Walker, said following the horrible 11-hour hostage ordeal that the prior preparation, training and periodic drills at his synagogue enabled them to recognize how and when to escape, saving their lives. He said that without the prior instruction they received, they would not have been prepared to act and flee when the situation presented itself.

So in the aftermath of the Texas attack, I am reconvening TKC's special ad hoc security committee to evaluate the robust security systems and safety precautions we already have in place, to determine whether additional safeguards are necessary, to test our systems and review and update our emergency operations plans, and also to work with law enforcement officials, the ADL, the Jewish Federation, and other community resources to help us train and drill our clergy, staff, regular ushers, and others about how to recognize and respond to an urgent crisis.

No matter what, our kehillah must not live in fear. Instead we will be prepared and we will remain vigilant, while we continue to share in the incredible joy of being Jewish.


