

A Note From Rabbi Jason Holtz



A Jewish View on Abortion

A lot has been said on the topic of abortion, especially in the last month when a pending Supreme Court decision overturning Roe v. Wade was leaked. The signs and slogans – pro-life, pro-choice, haven't really changed in decades. Despite that, the conversation is more necessary now than it has been in a long time. For the first time in the lives of women who may be pregnant, the Constitutional right to an abortion will no longer exist. That means lawmakers and voting citizens will have choices to make on what public policy will be. While the outcome of these decisions obviously affects pregnant women the most, we all need to think about the issue.

A lot of the conversation seems to turn on whether a fetus is a human life. Some argue that it is, and thus abortion is murder. Others say it is not, and abortion is a choice a woman can make, and is especially justified in cases like rape, murder, or when the life of the mother is at stake. For what it's worth, the majority view in Jewish law comes down on the side that a fetus is not a human life equal to the mother's. Some of this comes from the Torah, which discusses a case of battery against a woman who subsequently miscarries (Exodus 21:22). The Talmud says that for the first forty days after conception, the embryo is "merely water." After the first 40 days, it is understood to be a limb of the mother. Nearly 2,000 years ago, the rabbis of the Mishnah actually mandated abortion if the woman's life is at risk, saying, "If a woman is having a life-threatening difficulty in child-birth, one dismembers the embryo in her, limb by limb, because her life takes precedence over its life" (Mishnah Oholot 7:6).

Unsurprisingly, there is always debate in Jewish law. Some people grant a fetus considerable status. Yet, even for them, abortion is not akin to murder. That is because murder requires a motivation to murder. Without that motivation, it's something else — killing in self-defense, manslaughter, etc... In the case of abortion, some jurists who held that a fetus had a high status nonetheless treated the fetus as a potential "rodef," a pursuer, who chased after a woman's health and well-being, thus justifying abortion.

Yet, I think we miss something when we center the debate on the status of the fetus. Judaism doesn't usually speak in terms of rights – it speaks in the language of *mitzvot*, commandments or sacred obligations. While the U.S. Constitution has a Bill of Rights, the Torah has the Ten Commandments. And there is no mitzvah for a woman to be pregnant and have children, despite the fact that God says pretty early on to Adam, "Be fruitful and multiply" (Gen. 1:28). Rabbinic tradition has understood that to be a commandment solely incumbent on a man, and not a woman. The Talmud says, "A man is commanded with regard to the mitzvah to be fruitful and not a woman" (Talmud Yevamot 65b). Now, another time, we can discuss if men who don't want to be fathers should feel obligated to become fathers. For now, though, it is worth pointing out that for millennium, Jewish law and tradition did not tell women that they had to become pregnant and eventually be a mother. A little later in the Talmud, the story is recounted of a mother who wanted no more children -

Yehudah and Hizkiyya were twins... [their mother] Yehudit, wife of Rabbi Hiyyah, had acute birthing pain delivering them. She... went to Rabbi Hiyyah and asked, "Is a woman commanded to be fruitful and multiply?" He said to her, "No." So, she went and drank an infertility potion.

Now, I have no idea how effective an infertility potion would have been back then, but let's assume that Yehudit thought it would do the trick. She presumably could have done some other things to make sure she wouldn't have more children. She could have become celibate, potentially divorcing her husband in the process. Yet, she didn't want to do that. And, in talking it over with Hiyyah, her husband and a rabbi, she chose taking the equivalent of birth control medicine.

All of this leads to the conclusion — it is a woman's choice to decide to be pregnant, whether that means birth control or abortion, and women don't need to justify that choice to anyone. It is not just about the status of the fetus. It is also about whether a woman can be forced to be pregnant against her wishes. Being pregnant is no small thing — it affects one's body for nine months, and in some ways, forever. Being pregnant and giving birth entails a lot of risk. For women who chose to be pregnant and have children, being a parent is a blessing and wonderful thing. Yet for women who don't want to be pregnant and give birth, they shouldn't be made to against their will. As a father, I'm so awe-struck and appreciative of Jodi for giving life to our children. But I could never have demanded it of her. And our laws shouldn't demand it of any woman.


Novels and Nosh Book Club Sunday, June 12th at 11:00 AM
